Thousands of Child Care Providers will be Excluded from Next Round of Workforce Compensation Bonus Program Under Governor's Executive Budget Proposal

Governor Hochul's Executive Budget proposes to use \$280 million in leftover COVID-19 relief funds to provide an additional round of workforce compensation bonuses to eligible child care workers throughout New York State.

The Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) has indicated in meetings and public presentations it plans to limit participation in this next round of bonus payments to providers who received bonuses in 2023. The reason that has been offered for limiting payments to this group is that New York State is under a tight timeframe to fully liquidate remaining COVID-19 relief funds and risks forfeiting federal funds if any remain unused after the end of the federal fiscal year.¹

According to OCFS and New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOHMH) data², there were **18,350** licensed and registered providers in New York State on March 31, 2024. OCFS data details that **13,386** providers received workforce compensation bonus program payments in 2023.³

Of those providers that received payments in 2023, a small number have since closed their programs, while others have opened since that last grant program was announced.

In total, <u>5,292 of the 18,350</u> providers currently operating in the state will be ineligible for 2024 child care workforce bonus payments if Governor Hochul's budget proposal is adopted. These providers **represent 29% of the licensed and registered** programs in New York State. These providers are disproportionately located in New York City, where 35% of all active providers stand to be excluded from the next round of bonus payments.

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compensation program. The Senate and Assembly proposals to include \$220 million in state funds to the workforce compensation program would allow OCFS to open the program to all licensed and registered programs in the state and ensure that all eligible workers can receive payments.

Child care workers in New York State are among the lowest-paid workers in any sector, with 96% of jobs in the state paying more, on average, than child care. These bonuses, while not enough to properly compensate this critical workforce, are essential supports to early childhood educators.

All care setting types would be impacted by this exclusion, with only modest differences of exclusion rates by modality.
